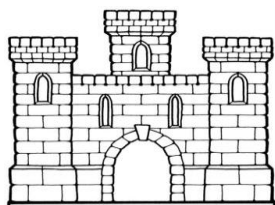
SCRABBLE

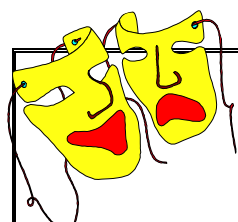
ARCHAEOLOGY

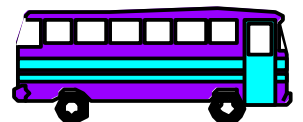
NOTE: Mary Gilbert was a local character; a boat woman who had a boat called Gwen Mary which she used to transport coal, coke and other provisions around the district from her wharf side delivery business. She also ran the George Inn, previously owned by her father William. The Inn is now the Wharf Inn and is still in the same building.

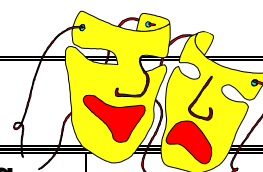


Thursday, 19 May:
