All these places can be approached on the Hop on, Hop off sight-seeing bus, or the local bus. Or, visit LLandaff Cathedral, parts dating back to the 12th century.


CRYPTIC CROSSWORDS

DIRECT MAIL SCHEME FOR U3A MAGAZINES

As many of you will be aware, there is an excellent magazine (Third Age Matters) published five times a year by the Third Age Trust, plus a Resources magazine three times a year. Third Age Matters used to be delivered in bulk to U3A branches, but this ceased a couple of years ago, to be replaced by the Direct Mail Scheme, whereby members could register and pay a nominal sum for postage. This scheme is ONLY available through each local U3A, and there are just two or three dates during each year when new subscribers/renewals can be notified.

If you would like to receive Third Age Matters and Resources delivered to your home, then please collect a form from the Treasurer's desk or the plastic rack in the foyer, complete it, and return it with a cheque (Countesthorpe U3A) for £2.15 to ensure that you are registered in the next tranche for a full year's worth of interesting reading.
