Much has been said about her common touch and humanity, but I suspect that there are a large number of people of my age who remember and associate her with the social revolution that took place in the 1960s as we shook off the dowdiness of the post-war era. Unlike many in the public eye, Cilla built and cherished the relationship she had with her public, never took it for granted.

For me personally, it was also a salutary reminder - we were born in the same year!

The other icon we have lost is Les Munro. Les Munro - who was he? Les Munro was a New Zealander and the last surviving pilot of the Dam Busters. Les was 96 when he died. I grew up learning of the exploits of that daring raid and, like many people, have watched countless films and TV programmes about the events leading up to and during that iconic action. By all accounts a quiet and unassuming man, he lived in his native land as an ordinary man who was involved in extraordinary events, yet living an ordinary life.

Two people, then, who had a great influence on our lives in Britain and that are remembered for very different reasons but both thought of with a considerable degree of affection and regard.

Now we should get on and enjoy the summer with U3A, there's so much more to do . . .

HISTORY GROUP VISITS LUTTERWORTH AND COTESBACH

On Monday, 3rd August a band of History Group members had a fairly local day out. In the morning our own Sybil Gamble (a retired Blue Badge guider) talked us round historical Lutterworth from St Mary's Church of 14th century Wycliffe fame to Sir Frank Whittle's 20th century jet power. And we now know where the cellars are for felons to be incarcerated! (We wish Sybil, who shortly will be leaving Countesthorpe to be nearer her family, a happy second retirement. We will miss her very much.)

The group then divided for a lunch break, some staying in Lutterworth, others going to Cotesbach to the Stables Cafe situated in a charming, slowly-developing (or that might be slowly crumbling – depending on your perspective!) old courtyard. The food there was excellent, though. The shop had organically grown produce for sale, from the walled garden. A blacksmith could also be seen at work.

In the afternoon we all joined again in Cotesbach at the lottery-funded Educational Trust and a knowledgeable lady, Sophy, showed us her large family home (Cotesbach Hall dating from 1703), garden, walled garden and the outbuildings, including a refurbished schoolhouse, which she is trying, together with the Educational Trust, to maintain and develop. It is a gargantuan task, but with the incredibly unusual number of very old family sermons and family records, it could become a valuable insight into local history. Her archives, of which she spoke enthusiastically, are gradually coming on line and items are maintained in a state-of-the-art environmentally-controlled location, and are being digitally captured. Cotesbach is well worth a visit, physically or electronically.

The morning and the afternoon proved that we have real history to see, right on our doorsteps.

BIRDWATCHING

During the summer, our indoor meetings on the first Thursday of the month have been replaced with outdoor visits to various bird reserves. We use car-sharing and usually leave the Village Hall at 9.30 am.

On 18 June, the group enjoyed a trip to Lyndon Osprey reserve at Rutland Water where they were able to observe the newly-returned ospreys in the open. Also, a remote camera had been installed in their nest, enabling live and close-up viewing (from the Lyndon Centre building) of the parents returning with fish and the chicks being fed.

The visit to Brandon Marsh on 31 July was attended by 12 members, two of whom were new to the group. The day was warm and sunny and we had a good morning's spotting. Some of us were fortunate enough to see a kingfisher flash by, and most of us noticed a hobby sitting for a long time on a dead tree. We also saw several herons, both on the ground and in flight, plus cormorants and many other water birds.

The next reserve visit date is 11 September – with the venue to be agreed in due course. There will be no reserve visits in August or October. Indoor activities resume on 5 November with a talk by Sue Wyllie on the "Birds of Botswana" in the small lounge at the Village Hall, 7.30 – 8.30 pm. Our 'Group Social' will be on 3 December, 7.30 – 9.00 pm in the small lounge.
