THE 'WESTON SUPERMARE HOLIDAY' - A REPORT

Monday morning, 21st February was cold, wet and windy which didn't bode well for the rest of the week. However, halfway down the motorway the sun was obviously trying desperately to get through and broken cloud revealed large patches of blue sky.

Most of the party opted to visit Aerospace Bristol, the remainder deciding to spend their three hours in Bristol itself. The museum dedicated itself to aero, space and transport engineering developments produced within the Bristol area over the last 130 years. Exhibits included early biplanes, helicopters, Concorde, Aston Martin and Bristol cars, plus the Skylark rocket and the Bloodhound missile. A fascinating visit. Even the time flew by!

Many of us, having spent a previous holiday at the Royal Grosvenor Hotel, were very familiar with its layout and routines – the main routine being the gin and tonic session before moving to the dining room.

Tuesday saw us depart to Newport (South Wales). We planned to go first to the museum and then to the cathedral. However, we spent so long in the museum/art gallery (plus the necessary coffee break) that we didn't have enough time for the cathedral. Just as well as it was closed.

We then travelled to Tredegar House (a National Trust property) where we roamed the house and gardens. By this time the weather had improved from being cold and drizzly to relatively acceptable. We were back at the hotel in plenty of time to prepare for our . . . G&T!

After yet another hearty breakfast Wednesday saw us setting out for a scenic coastal ride to Dunster, a charming village near Minehead. The village grew up around the castle which was built high on the neighbouring hill in the eleventh century. Here we roamed the streets and shops exploring the beautiful church of St. George and the working water mill, the origins of which date back to the fifteenth century and which grinds and bags wholemeal flour for the public to buy (National Trust).

After a relatively short coach trip we arrived in the picturesque village of Lynmouth. We decided to follow the gorge path to the cliff railway which connects Lynmouth to Lynton. The funicular railway is a tremendous feat of Victorian engineering operating two cable-linked cars on gravity and water power. Lynton found us in a remarkably extensive craft market displaying a tremendous variety of high quality crafts. But the need of

refreshments was too great to resist, so a local café fulfilled this need with excellent hot chocolate and coffee.

A longer day out meant a later return to the hotel, but we ensured that we were in plenty of time to repair to the bar for a chat and G&T before dinner.

After a couple of days of good weather things took a bit of a dive, being noticeably cooler on Thursday as we made our way to Glastonbury. If you have a burning desire to dress as a Goth or witch, or practice mixing weird potions, this is the place to be. We decided to have a coffee instead. However, we did spend time browsing in some unusual (and rather mysterious) shops.

On to Taunton in the afternoon. Although we spent some time in the town, the comprehensive museum had much to offer visitors – not least warmth and refreshments! We arrived back at the hotel in good time to meet for our chat together with . . . guess what?!

Friday being the last day meant packing up for the journey home, stopping at Cirencester on the way. Wandering around the shops and market, and visiting the beautiful church of St John the Baptist was lovely. A hearty lunch at an excellent restaurant sealed the whole holiday experience before the journey back to Countesthorpe.

In short we had a most pleasant holiday with everyone appearing to be in very good spirits throughout. Grateful thanks are due to Jill and Anne for all their hard work arranging it for us; not forgetting Sue Wyllie (for being bus monitor and her impressive ability to count passengers!).

To RENEW your membership FOR 2022/23, subscriptions are:

<u>Full Membership</u>: £18 (when paying by BACS) or £18.50 (per person) (When paying by cheque or cash).

<u>Associate membership</u> (with proof of full membership of another U3A) costs £10 by BACS or £10.50 (per person) by cheque or cash.

- 1. There is no need to complete another membership application form
- 2. **BY BANK TRANSFER:** Payee: The Countesthorpe U3A. Sort Code: 40-12-35 A/c no: 01402889 It is **IMPORTANT** that you use your U3A membership number as the reference, FOLLOWED by your name. If you do not know your number, call Barry or June who will help you.
- 3. **BY CHEQUE**: payable to "COUNTESTHORPE U3A", to our Membership Secretary, Mr B Hillyard, 35 Station Rd, Countesthorpe, Leicester LE8 5TA. You can also use the U3A's deposit box at the Library/Parish Office.

IF YOUR MEMBERSHIP HAS LAPSED, then please follow the instructions for new members as above. Fees are as shown. If you are unsure whether your membership lapsed, then please contact Barry on 277 4187.



MEMBERSHIP CARDS will not be issued, as little use is made of them. Proof of membership can be provided on request to Barry, if this is required.



KEEPING OUR RECORDS UP-TO-DATE: If you have changed your phone number(s), address or email, please advise Barry or June to enable us to update our system and thus keep in touch with you.

CLARIFICATION OF OUR REVISED 'MEMBERSHIP YEAR'

Our membership year formerly ran from 1 April until 31 March the following year. However, this caused administrative difficulties, coming as it did a month prior to the AGM. Therefore the Executive Committee took the decision to move the membership year to be from 1 June to 31 May the following year.

Thus, all paid-up members on 31 March 2022 automatically received a two month FREE extension to their membership until 31 May 2022. Thereafter, renewals will fall due on 1 June each year.

As before, if any new member joins during the year they will still pay the full amount, but their full or associate membership runs only until following 31 May. So, even if somebody joins, say, in April or May, they will still pay the full annual fee (it's currently only £18, after all!) and will be required to renew after 1 June alongside existing members.

Note that 50p is added if paying by cash/cheque, as we now incur bank charges. FULL: £18 by BACS or £18.50 cash/cheque; ASSOCIATE: £10 by BACS or £10.50 cash/cheque

This may seem a little hard on anyone joining late in 'our year' but we still have to pay the annual expenses, eg: capitation to the Third Age Trust.

We hope that this helps to explain and clarify the situation.



NOTES ON ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIPS AND GIFT AID FOR ALL MEMBERSHIPS

Associate Membership is ONLY available to individuals who have <u>proof</u> of FULL membership of another U3A. The current Associate subscription is £10 if paying by BACS or £10.50 by cash or cheque.

Please remember that when an individual has kindly 'gift aided' their subscription, they MUST be paying income tax to HRMC. Tax rules and especially thresholds change, and if anyone finds that they are no longer paying income tax it is THEIR RESPONSIBILITY to inform Barry Hillyard (Membership Secretary) on 0116 277 4187 so that their name can be removed from our Gift Aid claims. This is really important and we ask for your help in ensuring that we remain 'legal'! Please do continue to 'gift aid', though, as long as you are eligible. Thank you for your co-operation.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO COUNTESTHORPE U3A AGM 2022

After a near total shutdown due to the COVID virus lockdown we began restarting activities in August 2021. As I write I think all groups are back up and running - though some could do with more members. These include Cryptic Crosswords, Handbells, and Country Dancing. Sadly, we have lost a number of groups, likely as a result of our changing lifestyles over the last two years, waning interest or the lack of a Group Leader. These include Photography, Silver Strollers, Craft Circle, Nordic Walking, Pilates and Garden Appreciation. We remain thankful for our Group Leaders who have enabled us to continue with a wide range of activities.

Our membership is currently around 410 – about 100 below pre-COVID levels. We continue to attract a steady flow of new members, who are most welcome.

This year, as you may already be aware, your committee took the decision to alter the membership year so that it now runs from 1 June to 31 May. In effect this gives all existing members two free months. The reason for this is if we needed to revise the subscription rates, this could only be done at the AGM, which was AFTER the renewal date. So, we were in the position of having to wait another 10 months before being able to bring in changes. Given the rapidly changing situation, we need to be more responsive. Hence the change, which allows us to propose new subscriptions in May, to come into force the following month. David Hetterley, our Treasurer, will also give a little more information in his report.

The monthly meetings have had some good speakers – though not many of us have the requisite number of gardeners to utilise the services of the speaker in April! Members are beginning to have the confidence to return to the meetings, and attendance is slowly increasing.

U3a Holidays have begun again with a successful return visit to Weston-Super-Mare. Another holiday is planned for later in the year, to Torquay. History visits continue to be well-supported, and it is hoped that the general Outings programme will resume in the next few months. There have been several theatre visits, including visits to the Hinckley Concordia and Curve theatres, whilst in April we enjoyed a trip to Birmingham Repertory.

I must express my thanks to all the Group Leaders, and to my fellow committee members who have provided a great service to the members in organising our U3A.

The u3a Movement is 40 Years Old!

To mark the **u3a** movement's 40th Anniversary in 2022, the Trust is creating a **u3a** anniversary woodland situated in the Brecon Beacons.

u3a members' contributions to the u3a woodland will help benefit the environment, wildlife and climate for future generations. The movement's target is for 5,000 trees to be planted between October 2021 and March 2022.

This project was launched in members' magazine, Third Age Matters. **u3a** members can buy individual trees or a copse of 100 trees and u3as are also encouraged to plant trees within their own communities.

The money for the trees goes towards establishing the trees and part of the cost for each tree is reserved as future payments for maintenance. Once they are fully established, they will be looked after as part of routine woodland management. We are fortunate to have secured the Woodland in an area of outstanding natural beauty and the trees will be expertly looked after by skilled arborists.

To support this initiative, Countesthorpe **u3a** has purchased 5 trees at a cost of £30. Here is our 'certificate'


The group continues to be popular, and sees a group of between 20 and 30 dancers each time.
