### HAVE YOU EVER HEARD OF PICKLEBALL?

"Pickleball is a fun sport that combines elements of badminton, tennis, and table tennis. Played both indoors or outdoors on a badminton-sized court with a slightly modified tennis net. Two or four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a perforated polymer ball, over a net."

Sheila Pennington has taken the initiative on this and has arranged two taster sessions – details on our website (though by the time you actually read this Newsletter both may have already taken place.) The second one is on Sunday, 16 July 2-3 pm at the College. £2. Comfy clothes and trainers or similar are all you need. Why not give it a try?

Further information from the Pickleball England website explains: "The ball is served underhand from the right side of the court and is played diagonally across to the other service court. The defending side has to let the ball bounce first before it can be returned and, subsequently, the serving side also has to let the ball bounce. It is only on the third ball that the ball can be returned immediately. Either you can play a volley or you can let the ball bounce first.

"Points can only be scored by the serving side. You win a point if the defending side does not manage to return the ball, hits the ball out, does not let the serve ball bounce, volleys in the non-volley zone, or is hit by the ball. The game ends when one of the parties gets 11 points, with a 2-point lead."

# THE 'EASTBOURNE HOLIDAY' - A REPORT

The aim of the U3A is to encourage older people to share their knowledge and interests, so with this in mind Jill, with Sue's and Anne's help, kindly organised an educational five days in the south east of England, based in Eastbourne. It was not a seaside holiday, you understand!

As we gathered together before departing, we discussed Meteorology, and to cover the lousy weather forecast for the next five days, we'd all got a myriad of waterproofs and raincoats which we loaded onto our coach, but it was dry, although cool as we set off. Next, Geography. "Are we there yet?" was answered by "No, it's Saffron Walden". This was for a long lunch break, or do I mean investigation of a rural market town with a "new" town plan dating from the 1140s and loads of mediaeval buildings? To extend our History knowledge, Sue insisted we all have a town trail, which was great but didn't include cafés and jewellers, and anyway, due to an unexpected Bank Holiday Monday, a lot of Saffron Walden was shut. So, no "little something in diamonds" suitable for my imminent birthday. My husband said he was

upset. Luckily, many eateries were to be found open and although the Art Gallery was closed, just beyond it, the Bridge End Garden (winner of a UK Heritage Award) was a delight, with one of the garden designers on site who was happy to chat. That covered some Horticulture and Botany questions. Between us all, I'm sure we covered all the buildings on the trail including the gothic church and the pubs (well, one of them was Grade 1 listed]. Most intriguing was the building with the wall plaque that said "In 1832 on this spot nothing happened". Makes you wonder what occurred in all the other years? Discuss later?

So, onto the seafront, Trip Advisor 4\*, East Beach Hotel in Eastbourne. It had obviously been totally newly refurbished and huge ornate mirrors were everywhere, as were crystal chandeliers (although not in our shower room, a missed opportunity, I felt). Later, over dinner, room fittings were compared and Interior Design was explored. Domestic Science was an ongoing daily discussion for several groups at a variety of tables in the dining room, as menu choices were thoroughly examined.

Tuesday, saw a visit to Brighton for the majority of us. We all carted macs around but it was a dry day, warmer than Monday. There was the Art Gallery and Museum to add to our knowledge of modern paintings, although the former art teacher amongst us wondered who'd be the first to say "What, call that art?" It was a close run thing who won that competition. Luckily there were many other interesting exhibits to make the visit well worthwhile. The Royal Pavilion was stunning, the East Beach Hotel had nothing on the

magnificent, heavyweight, immense, extremely colourful and ornate chandeliers. The incredibly large, new carpets in public rooms warranted careful study of their own exhibition upstairs explaining the Technology and Engineering of their very specialized manufacture. I'm sure those who visited the Sea Life Centre would be only too happy to discuss the life cycle of a



seahorse or whatever if asked, or any other Zoology question pertaining to fishy things. Brighton's famous Lanes provided valuable lessons in Economics otherwise known as retail therapy. Everyone seemed to have enjoyed their day in their various pursuits of learning.

Waterproofs at the ready, on Wednesday we set off for Chartwell, Winston Churchill's home from 1924 until his death in 1965. It was mainly displayed as it was in the 1930's, with the exception of the secretaries' room, which covered the war years. There was a fascinating collection of his own

personal possessions accumulated over his lifetime, including gifts from all over the world. I was drawn to the solid gold, curved dagger, not sure why, but perhaps the three rather large diamonds set into the sheath might have had something to do with it. The National Trust guide pointed out that the display case was alarmed. Shame. Moving on and the uniform room gave us a small insight into Fashion and Costume, as it included Winston's ordinary clothes and accessories as well as uniforms from 1895, including those from the Boer War and World War 1, as well as the famous "siren" suit and the Robes of the Order of the Garter. Venturing outside, the house is set on a hillside with a lot to see and a lot of steps! But plenty of seating areas to enjoy the bursts of warm sunshine whilst enjoying the far reaching views. You could visit Winston's studio, the Golden Orfe pond, the rose garden (yet to bloom) and the vegetable garden, to name some of the nearest places. Further afield the estate also boasted a swimming pool, lakes, a tree house, Donkey Jack's caravan, among other attractions, as well as a bomb crater, a garden feature that not many of us can boast of, or wish for, come to think of it. As we reluctantly left, the skies quickly became overcast and the heavens began to open, at last raincoat carrying seemed justified but they were not needed as we'd already scrambled back onto the coach and, to add insult to injury, the downpour soon stopped as we drove. Nevertheless, there'd been enough moisture to create a mist over the cliffs, so our coach driver Geoff's planned drive via Beachy Head did not give the views promised. Actually, at that point there were no views at all!

Thursday provided a day of free choice. A lovely warm sunny day with clear blue skies. We took the macs anyway, after all, we are British. Some went by bus to Hastings, apparently watching fishing nets dry. On further investigation that was in the Fisherman's Museum, so they were gaining

knowledge after all. A few got windswept on the local opentopped bus. In Eastbourne there was a museum to visit, the pier, and a lifeboat station with a museum. Many took advantage of the beautiful weather and just sat on benches along the promenade (obviously revising the Theory of Evolution ready for tomorrow's excursion) and others, like myself, ambled into



town; it didn't look far but felt like several miles. Speaking of which, one brave soul, not to be short-changed, yomped with suitable gear and backpack all the way up to Beachy Head and back. She reported upon helpful locals and the magnificent views. So one of our number got that covered!

Our departure on Friday was another fine day, so throwing caution to the winds, I packed our rain gear in the suitcases and we began the journey home via Down House for sustenance and a detailed study of Darwin's life and his scientific discoveries - or whatever it was Jill said we had to learn. Geoff had great fun (?) negotiating the narrow country lanes as we neared Darwin's home, the rest of us all breathed in and shut our eyes as we scraped past the odd oncoming vehicle. We only had to reverse once. As we pulled into the car park, yes, you've guessed it, the rain came down and kept coming. Luckily, it was only a guick dash into the building. And what a fascinating place it is. All of Darwin's life was covered, from his childhood, his education and his failed studies to be a doctor and then a parson (he wasn't interested enough in either), then a 5 year trip of the exploration of South America on HMS Beagle. You'll have to Google his journey and discoveries, far too many to mention here, as are the experiments, research and scientific theories he continued with and published later in his life. He worked hard, despite bad health, but luckily, throughout his life he was supported by his rich society doctor and financier father and also by Josiah Wedgwood, who was his uncle and father-in-law (Darwin married his first cousin, Josiah's daughter Emma. After the birth of his first two children made his London home too cramped, his father made him a loan to buy Down House. Just as well, as he and Emma went on to have eight more children! Everything was well displayed and there was a lot to see. I highly recommend a visit. As the rain had conveniently stopped, there was just enough time to quickly explore the gardens and glass-houses where experiments had taken place. Just like Chartwell, everywhere was immaculately maintained by an army of volunteers. I'm thinking of giving our semi to the National Trust - gardening, cleaning and restoration sorted we'll live in and show the coach parties round!

Our final investigation was simple Mathematics. We tried to calculate how many yards per hour the coach was crawling as we approached the Dartford Tunnel, as we had plenty of time to do so, Geoff gave us extra time as we hit the gridlock (rush hour) on the M25 to try to convert this into kilometres (calculators not allowed). As there were no prizes, no answers were forthcoming. Nevertheless, we arrived home early evening, after a convenient motorway service station stop where I bought two M&S, microwavable, ready meals for later. Jill thinks of everything.

Thanks to her and everyone who made it a memorable holiday. Obviously, apart from those named (they worked hard enough) the others of our party are only too willing to answer questions on their newly gained knowledge, if only Jill hadn't lost the list of who they are. Oh well, maybe next time!

Tax rules and especially thresholds change, and if anyone finds that they are no longer paying income tax it is THEIR RESPONSIBILITY to inform Barry Hillyard (Membership Secretary) on 0116 277 4187 so that their name can be removed from our Gift Aid claims. This is really important and we ask for your help in ensuring that we remain 'legal'! Please do continue to 'gift aid', though, as long as you are eligible. Thank you for your co-operation.

As most of you know, each individual local u3a is a charity in its own right, operating according to the model constitution and under the auspices of the Third Age Trust. To further this sense of belonging to a national organisation, the magazine u3a Matters is available to every full member.

The system set up by the Third Age Trust assumes that every member who is registered with their local u3a, and therefore for whom we pay a capitation fee, will receive the magazine.




no ability whatsoever, the other half have been wrestling with cryptic crosswords most of their lives! It certainly keeps the brain more alert!
